Artist Forum

The Artist Forum stimulates discourse on the transmission of knowledge as it relates to artistic practice. Guest Artists will reflect on their personal artistic journey and role in furthering the development of the coastal carving and weaving arts. The forum provides an opportunity for artists to network with each other and learn.

Edge Exhibit

The Edge Exhibit is a showcase of carved and weaved works from all corners of our art community. Witness the relationship between the carver, the weaver and the coast as you experience the vast variety of art styles from traditional to contemporary, innovative to whimsical.

This year's exhibit will feature Through Our Eyes: a place-based photovoice project that engaged youth from Xa?uuk*i?ath territory (Opitsaht, Esowista, & Tofino) in photography and writing to foster intergenerational and cross-cultural knowledge exchange, artistic expression, and storytelling.

The Open Carving Area is a space within the festival for carvers to set up and work on projects. All carvers are welcome to come and carve, share techniques and gather inspiration from fellow artists of all skill levels. Carvers will also have the opportunity to interact with members of the visiting public that are interested in learning more about carving. Simply arrive with your tools and materials and our Open Carving Area host will set you up with a space to carve. There will be some carving grade wood available if you need.

Tool Shed

The tool shed is the location at the festival for all things steel. Improve your relationship with wood by improving your relationship with steel! There will be sharpening demonstrations and a space for tool makers to ply their wares. If you're into tools then this is the place to be.

From 12pm-1pm Saturday & Sunday Gordon Dick will be demonstrating an array of sharpening techniques to keep your tools functional, well-maintained, and carving ready.



Naa'Waya'Sum PoleViewing&Talk

This year the Carving On The Edge Festival is proud to partner with the Naa'Waya'Sum Coastal Indigenous Gardens, previously known as the Tofino Botanical Gardens. Naa'Waya'Sum refers to the passing of knowledge from generation to generation through observation and listening. The figures in the totem pole speak to this theme, specifically the relationship of grandparent to grandchild in traditional oral culture. Each crest in the carving represents a whole school of cultural teachings. In this way, the knowledge is shared for future generations.

The Naa'Waya'Sum pole, carved by Joe Martin, Gordon Dick, Robin Rorick, Robinson Cook, and Patrick Amos, was carved to mark the transition of the gardens and bring Nuu-Chah-Nulth teachings to the forefront. The pole hopes to inspire everyone from youth, locals and people from afar. The Naa'Waya'Sum Totem Pole will be available for viewing and open conversation with Joe Martin, lead carver on Friday 1-4pm.


